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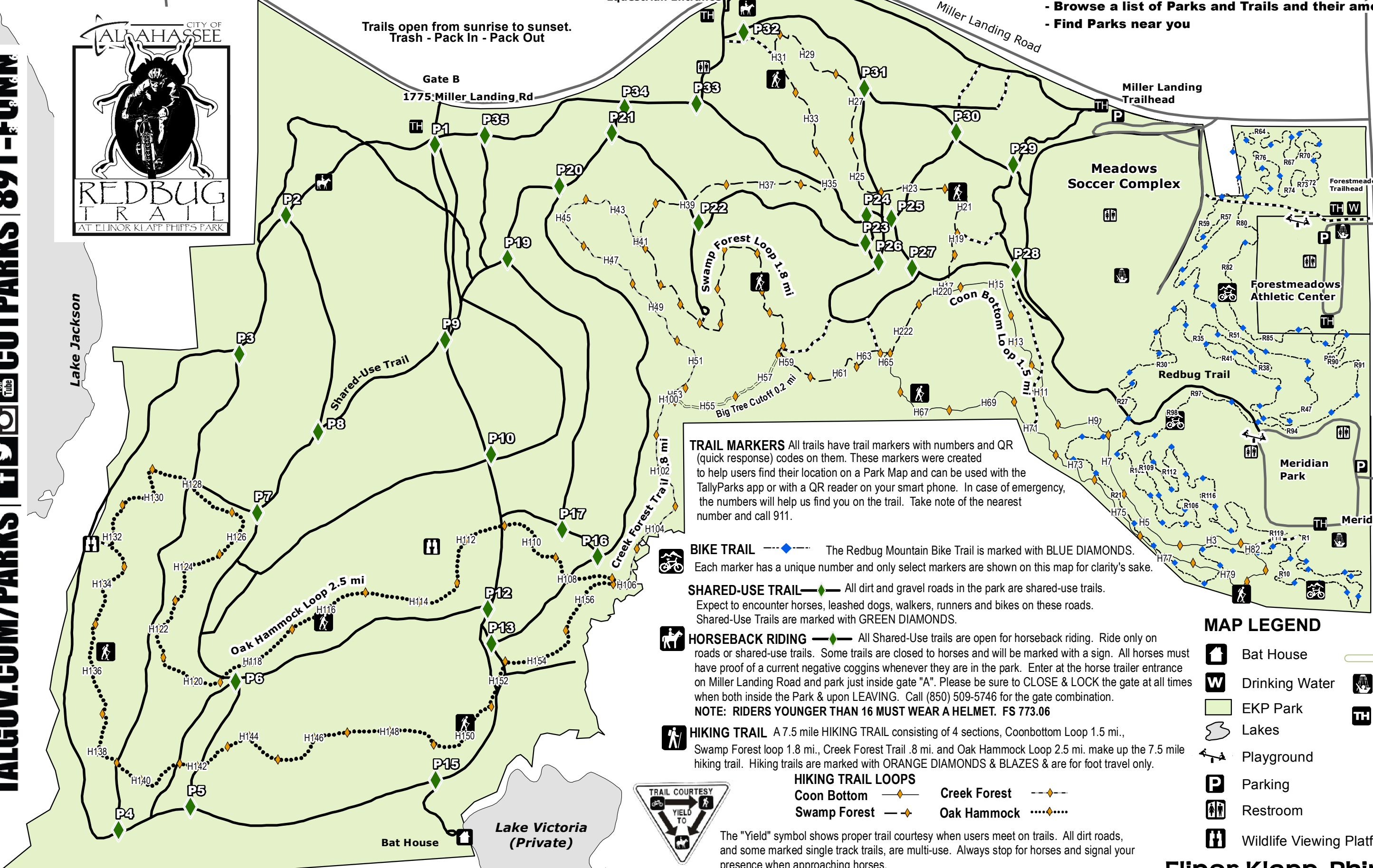

TRAIL MARKERS All trails have trail markers with numbers and QR (quick response) codes on them. These markers were created to help users find their location on a Park Map and can be used with the TallyParks app or with a QR reader on your smart phone. In case of emergency, the numbers will help us find you on the trail. Take note of the nearest number and call 911.

BIKE TRAIL The Redbug Mountain Bike Trail is marked with BLUE DIAMONDS. Each marker has a unique number and only select markers are shown on this map for clarity's sake.

SHARED-USE TRAIL All dirt and gravel roads in the park are shared-use trails. Expect to encounter horses, leashed dogs, walkers, runners and bikes on these roads. Shared-Use Trails are marked with GREEN DIAMONDS.

HORSEBACK RIDING All Shared-Use trails are open for horseback riding. Ride only on roads or shared-use trails. Some trails are closed to horses and will be marked with a sign. All horses must have proof of a current negative coggins whenever they are in the park. Enter at the horse trailer entrance on Miller Landing Road and park just inside gate "A". Please be sure to CLOSE & LOCK the gate at all times when both inside the Park & upon LEAVING. Call (850) 509-5746 for the gate combination.
NOTE: RIDERS YOUNGER THAN 16 MUST WEAR A HELMET. FS 773.06

HIKING TRAIL A 7.5 mile HIKING TRAIL consisting of 4 sections, Coonbottom Loop 1.5 mi., Swamp Forest loop 1.8 mi., Creek Forest Trail .8 mi. and Oak Hammock Loop 2.5 mi. make up the 7.5 mile hiking trail. Hiking trails are marked with ORANGE DIAMONDS & BLAZES & are for foot travel only.

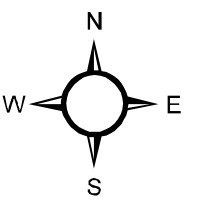

**BUTTERFLY CHECKLIST
ELINOR KLAPP-PHIPPS PARK**

Elinor Klapp -Phipps Park boasts a greater diversity of butterflies, over 80 species sighted since 2001, than any other site of its size in Florida. Many species are uncommon or rare. More than 50 species have been seen each month from April to September. During these warmer months, hundreds of individuals, representing 30-40 species, can often be seen in a day. Butterflies occur throughout the park and can be found in open fields and sunny spots along shared use dirt road trails. Some prefer shady areas along roadsides, but only a few tolerate dense shade sometimes found along narrow hiking trails. Butterflies drink nectar from wildflowers and often are seen on or near wildflowers, including "weedy" species without classic showy blooms.

This checklist includes all species known to occur in the park. Numbers, after the scientific name, indicate the months when the adult butterflies have been seen (1=January, 2=February, etc.). A letter at the end indicates the frequency of sightings by an experienced observer searching most of the park during this flight period.

A = ABUNDANT, ALMOST ALWAYS SEEN.

C = COMMON, OFTEN SEEN.

U = UNCOMMON, SOMETIMES SEEN.

R = RARE, VERY SELDOM SEEN.

Butterfly names follow the North American Butterfly Association's, 2001, Checklist & English Names of North American Butterflies (2nd edition).
