2018-2019 Budget - Amendment No. 16

#### Recommendation

Staff recommends the Governing Board adopt Resolution No. 860 amending the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 budget and allow staff to realign revenues and reserves to maintain the proper balance in each fund.

### **Background**

District procedures allow for budget amendments to occur within 60 days following the end of a fiscal year (FY). Based on expenditures paid that count toward the FY 2018-2019 budget, several changes are requested to properly align budget with these costs. Amendment No. 16 realigns budget categories of Salaries and Benefits (S&B), Contracted Services, Operating Expenses, Operating Capital Outlay (OCO), and Fixed Capital Outlay (FCO) within and across programs, activities, funds, and projects. This amendment does not increase or decrease the total District budget.

Budget realignments include:

- 1. \$93,300 in Personnel Budget:
  - a. \$85,510 in S&B related to Hurricane Michael response and recovery. Budget is moving from Activities 120 Research, Data Collection, Analysis and Monitoring, 210 Land Acquisition, 370 Technology and Information Services and 410 Consumptive Use Permitting to 113 Other Water Resources Planning (\$42,450), 310 Land Management (\$39,650), and 111 Water Supply Planning (\$3,410).

- b. \$3,700 in S&B due to increased information technology needs in mitigation. Budget is moving from Activity 230 Surface Water Projects to Activity 270 Technology and Information Services.
- c. \$2,650 in S&B for salary adjustments in the Division of Administration. Budget is moving from Activity 620 Technology and Information Services to Activity 614 Administrative Support.
- d. \$1,440 in OPS S&B for Minimum Flows and Minimum Water Levels (MFLs) data collection activities. Budget is moving from Activity 113 Other Water Resources Planning to Activity 112 MFLs.

#### 2. \$74,300 in FCO:

- a. \$72,500 for improvements at the DeFuniak Springs Service Office. Budget is being transferred from Activities 430 Environmental Resource and Service Water Permitting and 440 Other Regulatory and Enforcement Activities to Activity 250 Facilities Construction and Major Renovations as well as from other budget categories within Activity 250.
- b. \$1,800 for the installation of bullet proof glass on the dais in the Governing Board room located at District headquarters. Budget is being transferred within the same Activity 330 Facilities.

#### 3. \$10,615 in Operating Expense:

- a. \$10,000 for the move from the Crestview Field Office the DeFuniak Springs Service Office. Budget is being transferred from Activity 440 Other Regulatory and Enforcement Activities to Activity 430 Environmental Resource and Service Water Permitting.
- b. \$615 for gate repairs at the Lake Jackson facility in Tallahassee. Budget is being transferred within the same Activity 320 Works.

### 4. \$10,150 in OCO:

- a. \$9,650 for a camera/recorder with 1,000-foot cable for well inspections. Budget is being transferred within the same Activity 420 Water Well Construction Permitting and Contractor Licensing.
- b. \$500 for window tinting services for the District van. Budget is being transferred from Activity 250 Facilities Construction and Major Renovations to Activity 360 Fleet Services.
- 5. \$2,450 in Contracted Services for legal services related to the Governing Board. Budget is being transferred from Activity 540 Lobbying/Legislative Affairs/Cabinet Affairs to Activity 611 Executive Direction.

Choctawhatchee River/Holmes Creek WMA

### **Recommendation**:

Staff recommends the Governing Board authorize staff to move forward with appraisals of the amendment.

#### **Background**:

In August 2001, the District purchased a conservation easement on 1,109.36 acres from the Glover family for \$600,000 with Preservation 2000 funds. The property is located on Creek Road, West of Highway 79 in Washington County (see attached maps).

The Glover family has requested an amendment to the conservation easement. The family would like to amend the conservation easement to allow 12,000 square feet of impervious surface for residential purposes to allow another residence, supporting buildings, any future needs, and an existing prohibited structure (carport containing 602 square feet). The easement only allows for additional impervious surface for domestic livestock production uses and practices.


Resource Management staff conducted a desktop analysis of the impact of adding 12,000 square feet of impervious surface on this property for residential purposes. Staff concluded the addition of 12,000 square feet of impervious surface for residential purposes will have a negligible impact on the conservation easement as long as development activity remains in the uplands.


It should be noted most District easements allow for impervious surface for residential purposes.

Staff is presenting information on this amendment request by the Glover family to the Committee to inquire on whether or not any member of the Governing Board has concerns with this amendment prior to ordering appraisals and expending funds. If approved, the District will request the landowner pay all expenses related to the amendment except for staff time. Expenses to accomplish the amendment include the following:

- Appraisal and review appraisal
- Legal counsel fees
- Recording fees
- Documentary Stamp Tax

#### Recommendation

Staff recommends the Governing Board authorize the Executive Director to execute an agreement with Franklin's Promise Coalition, Inc., for conservation corps crews, subject to legal and administrative review and approval of the agreement.

#### **Background**

Franklin's Promise Coalition, Inc., is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization headquartered in Apalachicola that provides conservation corps crews to assist conservation landowners with implementation of various land management activities. These crews are comprised of young people who are typically exploring career options while obtaining on-the-job experience, training, and life skills. The employees are paid for their work using funds Frankin's Promise has secured through various grant programs. The conservation corps crews have the personnel, experience, and expertise to undertake various land management activities on District-owned lands at no cost to the District. Franklin's Promise currently has three crews established in northwest Florida (Conservation Corps of the Forgotten Coast, Conservation Corps of the Emerald Coast-Bay County, and Conservation Corps of the Emerald Coast-Escambia County).

Activities performed on District lands by conservation corps crews could include: recreation site improvement; construction of recreation facilities and amenities; installation of fencing; timber stand improvement activities such as sand pine and hardwood or brush eradication; treatment and control of exotic and invasive vegetation; planting of trees and other vegetation; prescribed burning assistance (under the supervision of District prescribed burn managers), including preparation of areas for prescribed burning, prescribed burn implementation, and post-burn activities and mopup; shoreline stabilization and restoration; erosion prevention and repair; and other similar

activities associated with the management of District-owned conservation lands. It is anticipated the relatively small amount of time District staff would need to dedicate to working with these groups will be well worth the investment, when considering the land management services that will be provided by the conservation corps.

Board of County Commissioners for the Bellamy Bridge Heritage Trail

#### Recommendation

Staff recommends approval of a three-year extension to the Memorandum of Agreement with Jackson County Board of County Commissioners for completion of Phase III trail development activities, subject to approval by the County Commission.

#### **Background**

Since 2012, the District has been working with Jackson County on the development of a one-half mile long heritage trail from Hwy. 162 to the old Bellamy Bridge site located on the Chipola River. The trail, now known as the "Bellamy Bridge Heritage Trail," is located entirely on District lands within the Chipola River Water Management Area. The trail route and bridge have significant cultural and historical context and these resources enhance and complement Jackson County's ecotourism program, especially the popular ghost tours around Halloween to possibly encounter the legendary "Ghost of Bellamy Bridge."

There have been two memoranda of agreement (MOA) with Jackson County to facilitate this project in coordination with the non-profit "Friends of Bellamy Bridge" organization. Jackson County and the Friends of Bellamy Bridge have completed the first two phases of the trail development. The third phase, which involves construction of wooden foot bridges across gaps in the old roadbed causeway and other related improvements, was planned for construction when Hurricane Michael caused further project delays.

The latest MOA expires on November 23, 2019, and needs to be extended to allow for completion of the planned facilities.

## **Background**





#### Recommendation

Staff recommends the Governing Board authorize the Executive Director to negotiate and enter into a contract with Diversified Professional Services (DPS) Corporation for an amount not to exceed \$139,852.00 for construction services for the Seven Runs Creek streambank restoration and protection project.

#### **Background**

On September 19, 2019, the District issued an Invitation to Bid (ITB) 19B-012 for construction services for the Seven Runs Creek shoreline restoration and protection project. The project is designed to stabilize, restore, and protect the shoreline along Seven Runs Creek as well as enhance public access.

Through this project approximately 100 linear feet of streambank along Seven Runs Creek will be stabilized with bioengineering methods that employ primarily natural materials and techniques, such as vegetated retaining walls, native materials, and root mass through installation of live native plants.

Construction activities will be paid for through the District fund balance.

### Recommendation

#### **Discussion**

#### **DESCRIPTION:**

Destin Water Users, Inc. (DWU) requests renewal and modification of Individual Water Use Permit (IWUP) No. 2B-091-5916-5 for the continued authorization of groundwater withdrawals from the Sand-and-Gravel aquifer for landscape irrigation use via an Aquifer Storage and Recovery (ASR) system located at the George F. French Water Reclamation Facility in Destin, FL. The applicant requests minor increases in the average daily and maximum monthly withdrawals.

DWU has operated the ASR system since 2009 and provides public access reclaimed water to customers for the use of landscape and golf course irrigation. DWU's ASR system injects reclaimed water into the main producing zone of the Sand-and-Gravel aquifer when a surplus supply exists, and withdraws stored groundwater when demand exceeds supply from the treatment plant. The cycles of injection, storage, and recovery are conducted via seven production wells, ASR #1 through #7.

DWU's ASR system currently permitted by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) authorizes an average daily capacity of 2.125 million gallons per day. The average daily withdrawal allocation for the previous IWUP was based on a water balance which assumed equal quantities of injection and withdrawal over any given 12 month period. The currently requested average daily and maximum monthly withdrawals represent a 5.66 percent and 2.43 percent increase over the previously permitted amounts, respectively, and are considered to be reasonable for the requested 5-year permit duration.

Staff used the program DRAWDOWN to estimate potential impacts to the Sand-and-Gravel aquifer associated with the requested average daily withdrawal rate. The aquifer parameters used by staff were derived from groundwater modeling previously performed by Schlumberger Water Services USA, Inc. on behalf of DWU, and submitted to the District in 2010. Simulated drawdowns associated with 5 years of pumping at the recommended average daily withdrawal are approximately 26 feet and 22 feet at distances of one-half and one mile, respectively, from the center of pumping.

The simulated drawdowns in the Sand-and-Gravel aquifer are conceptually mitigated by the artificial recharge of the aquifer from the injection of reclaimed water. Hydrologic data derived from main producing zone monitor well SZMW #2 substantiates the drawdown calculations as the water levels move between 21.9 feet below land surface during periods of low recharge/high recovery to 1.6 feet below land surface during periods of high recharge/low recovery. Under the scenario of continuous injection and recovery over a 24-month period, the recommended withdrawal amounts are not anticipated to interfere with existing legal uses.

Historically, DWU was required to withdraw no more water than injected over a given time-frame (24-months in the current permit). DWU has requested to modify this condition, such that a minimum 1.0

million gallon positive balance will be maintained at any given time over the life of the permit. Within cycles of injection, storage, and recovery for an ASR system, long periods of storage may result in losses of reclaimed water to the storage zone and reduction in recovery efficiency. The combination of high irrigation demand over long storage periods without accompanying recharge will result in the substantial drawdowns predicted by District staff above as native groundwater replaces the injected reclaimed water. Therefore, staff recommend the permit condition which requires that "the Permittee, at no time, shall withdraw more water than is injected within a 24-month period" remain in effect throughout the recommended permit duration.

Additionally, staff recommend that DWU continue its hydrologic monitoring program, including water level and water quality sampling, in order to satisfy the conditions of this permit through the recommended permit duration.

#### PERMIT APPLICATION REVIEW:

Section 373.223, Florida Statutes (F.S.), and section 40A-2.301, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), require an applicant to establish that the proposed use of water:

- (a) Is a reasonable-beneficial use;
- (b) Will not interfere with any presently existing legal use of water; and,
- (c) Is consistent with the public interest.

In addition, the above requirements are detailed further in the District's Water Use Permit Applicant's Handbook. District staff have reviewed the water use permit application pursuant to the above-described requirements and have determined that the application meets the conditions for issuance of this permit.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is the determination of the staff that the water use amounts recommended, as conditioned, are reasonable-beneficial, consistent with the public's interest, and will not interfere with existing legal users. This determination has been made according to provisions of Chapter 373, F.S., and Chapter 40A-2, F.A.C.

Staff recommends that the applicant be granted an Individual Water Use Permit for an annual average daily withdrawal of 1.12 million gallons; and a maximum monthly withdrawal of 75.9 million gallons. Staff also recommends that the expiration date of the permit be November 1, 2024, and that the permit be conditioned as per the "Conditions for Issuance" included in Exhibit A of the permit document.

#### **Specific Conditions**

- 1. This permit shall expire on November 1, 2024.
- 2. This Permit authorizes the Permittee to make a combined average annual withdrawal of 1.12 million gallons per day (75.9 million gallons per month maximum) of groundwater from the Sandand-Gravel aquifer for landscape/recreation use. The individual facilities authorized to make this combined withdrawal are shown in the table below in the following condition. The total combined amounts of water withdrawn by all facilities listed shall not exceed the amounts identified above.

- 4. The Permittee shall include the Individual Water Use Permit number and the well's Florida Unique Identification Number (e.g. AAM6231 for ASR #1) when submitting reports or otherwise corresponding with the District.
- 5. The Permittee shall maintain in-line, totalizing flow meters at the wellheads of the following wells: ASR #1, ASR #2, ASR #3, ASR #4, ASR #5, ASR #6, and ASR #7. The meters shall be configured to allow for reporting of injection and withdrawal amounts discretely. The meters shall be maintained to be at least 95% accurate and any meter determined defective must be replaced within 30 days of its discovery. The Permittee, within 30 days of well completion or completion of project construction, shall provide documentation to the District that the required flow meters have been installed and report the initial meter readings.
- 6. The Permittee, at the time of requesting a permit modification or renewal, shall submit documentation of the flow meter calibration and accuracy rating for each flow meter to the District using the Flow Meter Accuracy Report Form (Form 170). The Permittee, if preferred, may submit

the report electronically by downloading the correct form from the District website, filling it out properly, and e-mailing it to compliance@nwfwater.com.

- 7. The Permittee, by January 31 of each year, for Storage-Injection, shall submit a water use report for the previous calendar year (January December), even if no water is used. The Permittee shall record the data required on Water Use Summary Reporting Form (Form 172) for each injection/recovery well (ASR #1 ASR #7). The Permittee, if preferred, may submit the report electronically by downloading the correct form from the District website, filling it out properly, and e-mailing it to compliance@nwfwater.com.
- 8. The Permittee, by January 31 of each year, for Recovery-Withdrawal, shall submit a water use report for the previous calendar year (January December), even if no water is used. The Permittee shall record the data required on Water Use Summary Reporting Form (Form 172) for each injection/recovery well (ASR #1 ASR #7). The Permittee, if preferred, may submit the report electronically by downloading the correct form from the District website, filling it out properly, and e-mailing it to compliance@nwfwater.com.
- 9. The Permittee shall withdraw no more water than is injected within the most recent 24-month period. However, with District approval, during periods of moderate or severe drought or exceptional demand, the Permittee may withdraw more water than is injected over the most recent 24-month period.

The Permittee, within 15 days of initiating groundwater withdrawals exceeding the most recent 24-month period of injection, shall submit to the District a request detailing the basis for increased withdrawals, the estimated duration of increased withdrawals, and the requested duration to exceed the most recent 24-month period. The Permittee, if preferred, may submit the request electronically to <a href="mailto:compliance@nwfwater.com">compliance@nwfwater.com</a>.

- 10. The Permittee, by April 30, July 31, October 31, and January 31 shall submit to the District:
  - a. Static water levels taken from each monitor well (SZMW #1, SZMW #2, SZMW #3, SZMW #4, SMW #1, and SMW #2) within the first two weeks of each month, during the previous three months.
  - b. Water quality analysis taken from each production well (ASR #1 ASR #7) within the first two weeks of each month, during the previous three months.

The Permittee, for their convenience, is authorized to submit to the District copies of all reporting required by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) Domestic Wastewater Facility Permit FLA010194 and Underground Injection Control Facility Permits 0213104-003-UO/5X through 0213104-009-UO/5X upon the dates specified in the FDEP permits. These submittals will be accepted in lieu of the above water level and water quality data as long as the sampling and reporting frequencies of the FDEP permit are more stringent than those included in this condition.

11. The Permittee shall annually evaluate the efficiency of each of its irrigation units and undertake necessary maintenance, repairs and upgrades to provide for the proper efficiency of its equipment. The Permittee shall maintain the irrigation system to prevent wasteful runoff from the property associated with irrigation.

- 12. The Permittee shall equip the well and irrigation system with an anti-siphoning device if chemicals are to be applied through the irrigation system, as required by section 487.064, F.S.
- 13. The Permittee shall use "Florida-friendly" landscape techniques, as described in section 373.185, F.S., when designing or modifying the landscape of the irrigated sites.
- 14. The Permittee shall maintain rain sensing devices which will override any automatic irrigation system when adequate rainfall occurs, and shall operate its irrigation system to prevent wasteful runoff.
- 15. The Permittee shall enhance irrigation efficiency by restricting irrigation activity during the higher evapotranspiration period of 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.
- 16. The Permittee shall maximize the use of reclaimed water if it is available and its use is environmentally, economically and technically feasible.

#### **Standard Conditions**

- 17. All water uses authorized by this permit shall be implemented as conditioned by this permit, including any documents incorporated by reference in a permit condition. The District may revoke this permit, in whole or in part, or take enforcement action, pursuant to sections 373.136 or 373.243, F.S., unless a permit modification has been obtained to address the noncompliance.
- 18. The Permittee shall immediately notify the District in writing of any previously submitted information that is later discovered to be inaccurate.
- 19. This permit does not convey to the Permittee any property rights or privileges other than those specified herein, nor relieve the Permittee from complying with any applicable local government, state, or federal law, rule, or ordinance.
- 20. The Permittee shall notify the District in writing within 45 days of any sale, transfer, or conveyance of ownership or any other loss of permitted legal control of the Project and/or related facilities from which the permitted water use is made. Where Permittee's control of the land subject to the permit was demonstrated through a lease, the Permittee must either submit documentation showing that it continues to have legal control or transfer control of the permitted system/project to the new landowner or new lessee. All transfers of ownership are subject to the requirements of section 40A-2.351, F.A.C. Alternatively, the Permittee may surrender the water use permit to the District, thereby relinquishing the right to conduct any activities under the permit.
- 21. Nothing in this permit should be construed to limit the authority of the District to declare a water shortage and issue orders pursuant to Chapter 373, F.S. In the event of a declared water shortage, the Permittee must adhere to the water shortage restrictions, as specified by the District. The Permittee is advised that during a water shortage, reports shall be submitted as required by District rule or order.
- 22. With advance notice to the Permittee, District staff with proper identification shall have permission to enter, inspect, observe, collect samples, and take measurements of permitted facilities to determine compliance with the permit conditions and permitted plans and specifications. The Permittee shall either accompany District staff onto the property or make provision for access onto the property.

- 23. The Permittee may seek modification of any term of an unexpired permit. The Permittee is advised that section 373.239, F.S., and section 40A-2.331, F.A.C., are applicable to permit modifications.
- 24. The District reserves the right to curtail permitted withdrawal and diversion rates if the withdrawal or diversion causes harm to legal uses of water, offsite land use, or water resources and associated environmental features that existed at the time of permit application.
- 25. The Permittee shall not cause harmful saltwater intrusion. The District reserves the right to curtail permitted withdrawal rates if withdrawals cause harmful saline water intrusion.
- 26. The Permittee's consumptive use of water as authorized by this permit shall not reduce a flow or level below any minimum flow or level established by the District or the Department of Environmental Protection pursuant to sections 373.042 and 373.0421, F.S. If the Permittee's use of water causes or contributes to such a reduction, then the District shall modify or revoke the permit, in whole or in part, unless the Permittee implements all provisions applicable to the Permittee's use in a District-approved recovery or prevention strategy.
- 27. The Permittee shall mitigate any harm caused by withdrawals or diversions permitted herein on legal water uses, offsite land use, and water resources and associated environmental features which existed at the time of permit application. Mitigation may include modification of the Permittee's pumping schedule (i.e., duration, withdrawal rates, time of day, etc.), the lowering of the affected pump(s) or the replacement of the well(s) including proper plugging and abandonment of the well(s) that is replaced. The Permittee, upon receipt of an allegation of interference, shall retain the services of an appropriate licensed professional to investigate the alleged interference. The Permittee shall ensure their chosen professional investigates any alleged interference within 48 hours of the allegation being made and provides the conclusions of the investigation to the entity alleging the impact within 72 hours of the allegation being made. If it is determined that the use of a well has been impaired as a result of the Permittee's operation, the Permittee shall complete the required mitigation within 30 days. The Permittee shall be responsible for the payment of services rendered by the licensed professional. The Permittee, within 30 days of any allegation of interference, shall submit a report to the District including the date of the allegation, the name and contact information of the party making the allegation, the result of the investigation made, and any mitigation action undertaken.

This is a challenge brought by Petitioner Diaz, a homeowner within the Tallahassee subdivision known as Palafox, to an environmental resource permit issued by the District to Palafox, LLC, whose principal is Gary Zins. The permit authorizes Palafox, LLC, to construct a surface water management system to serve an approximately 2.68-acre development (multi-family housing) at the intersection of Palafox Lane and Martin Hurst Road in Tallahassee.

The Petitioner alleges, primarily, that the development will violate District statutes and rules by causing increased amounts of stormwater/flooding on Petitioner's property. The District's position is that Palafox, LLC, has met the conditions for issuance of the permit and the engineering provided by Palafox, LLC, demonstrates that no such impacts to Petitioner's property will occur.

The Amended Petition has been forwarded to the Division of Administrative Hearings (DOAH) for assignment of an administrative law judge (ALJ). DOAH will assign an ALJ who will issue an initial order setting the litigation schedule. The District is confident in its position and intends to vigorously defend its decision, and the District understands that Palafox, LLC, intends to intervene in the case to defend the permit, also.
