SUBJECT: Consideration of Contract Renewal with the Florida Fish and Wildlife

Conservation Commission for Law Enforcement/Security Services (Enhanced

Patrol) on District Lands

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Governing Board authorize the Executive Director to execute an amendment to the existing agreement with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission for Law Enforcement and Security Services (Scheduled Enhanced Patrol and As-Needed Enhanced Patrol) on District Lands during Fiscal Year 2015-2016 with a Maximum Total Compensation amount not to exceed \$89,000, subject to approval of the FY 2015-2015 budget.

Background:

Since March 2008, the District has contracted with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) to provide an "Enhanced Patrol" program that provides law enforcement for the Perdido River recreation sites, as well as a number of boat landings and camping areas nearby on the Escambia River. This contract provides for Scheduled Enhanced Patrols in the Perdido and Escambia River Water Management Areas (WMAs), but also allows for As-Needed Enhanced Patrols in other WMAs. The Enhanced Patrols are assigned through written Work Orders for specific dates and locations.

Enhanced Patrols are also available to the District to address problems on any of its other landholdings. These patrols are used to address known problem areas where the District does not currently have contract law enforcement and has identified there is a need for enhanced service. The District has a number of public recreation areas where these efforts may be needed to address issues such as excessive vandalism, overcrowding of camping areas, hunter trespass, nighttime parties, vehicle burglary issues, etc. In addition to the known problem areas, Enhanced Patrol work can be assigned to new problems as they arise during the year. The Enhanced Patrols are assigned only through separate written Work Orders for

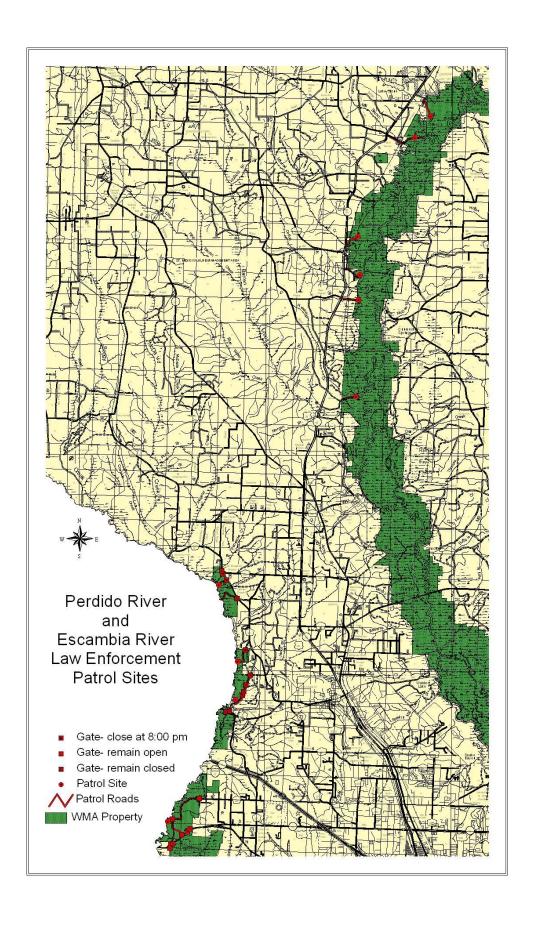
specific dates and locations. No work is authorized outside the scope of a District Work Order.

During Fiscal Year 2014-2015, District staff issued one Enhanced Patrol Work Order. It was during the warm months of calendar year 2015 for the Bay County portion of the Econfina Creek WMA, which includes high-use recreational areas such as Pitt and Sylvan Springs, the canoe launch at Highway 20, Cat Creek and associated areas. FWC also patrols at Williford Spring during the restoration and construction for trespassing, vandalism and theft.

In this year's contract, staff has included \$38,000 for Scheduled Patrol on the Perdido and Escambia WMAs, and \$33,300 for As-Needed Patrol in other problem hotspots on an asneeded basis. The remaining \$17,700 is for administrative, vehicle and equipment expenses. The contract pays FWC officers their individual overtime rate; pays reporting hours for the Reporting Captain or Reporting Lieutenant who coordinates and schedules the work and prepares invoices; and reimburses vehicle mileage at the State of Florida's current vehicle mileage rate. Therefore, the contract amount of \$89,000 for Fiscal Year 2015-2016 is considered to be Maximum Total Compensation which should provide an appropriate amount of funds to cover the scheduled work and the Enhanced Patrols, including the 2016 Bay County, Econfina Creek WMA summer work. The District only pays for actual hours worked and actual mileage.

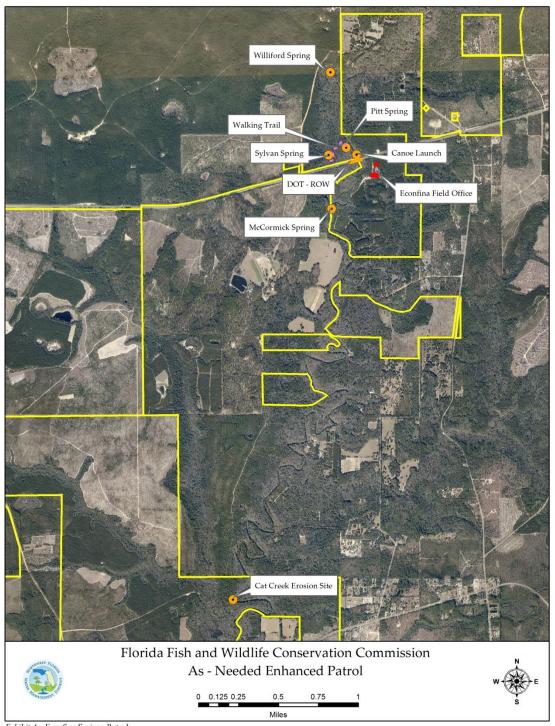

SUBJECT: Consideration of Contract Renewal with Washington County Sheriff's

Office for Law Enforcement and Security Services; Choctawhatchee

River and Holmes Creek and Econfina Creek WMAs

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Governing Board approve renewal of the agreement with the Washington County Sheriff's Office in the amount of \$145,778.60 to provide law enforcement and security services for District lands located in Bay and Washington counties, and authorize the Executive Director to execute the new agreement, subject to approval of the Fiscal Year 2015 - 2016 budget.

Background:

As part of our continuing effort to provide the public with a safe and secure recreational experience on District lands in Bay and Washington counties, staff proposes to renew our 12-month contract with the Washington County Sheriff's Office to provide law enforcement and security services. Through an agreement between the Bay and Washington County Sheriffs, the Washington County deputies employed under this contract also patrol District lands in Bay County.

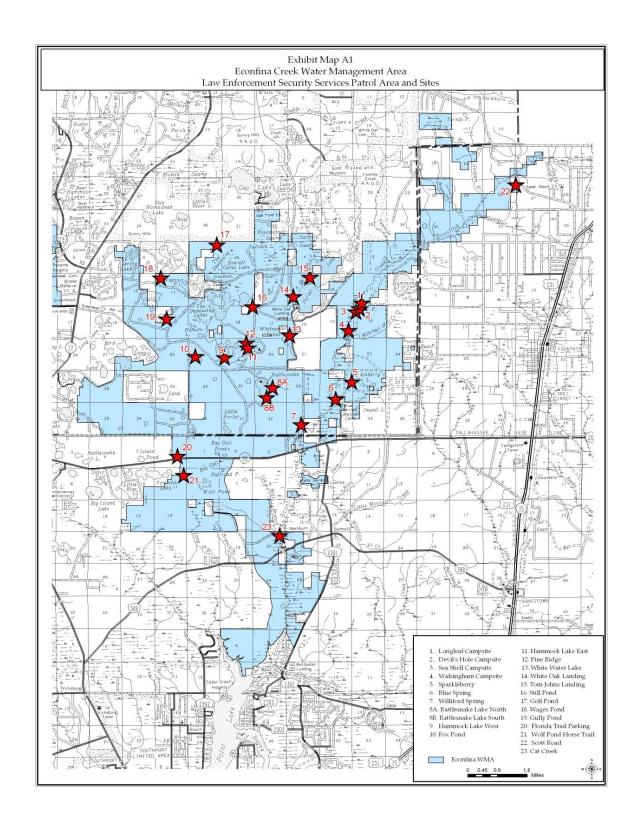
For Fiscal Year 2015-2016, staff is recommending the same level of service that we contracted in the previous year, and the Sheriff's Office has agreed to this proposed scope of work with no change to the rates that we are currently paying for personnel and vehicle use.

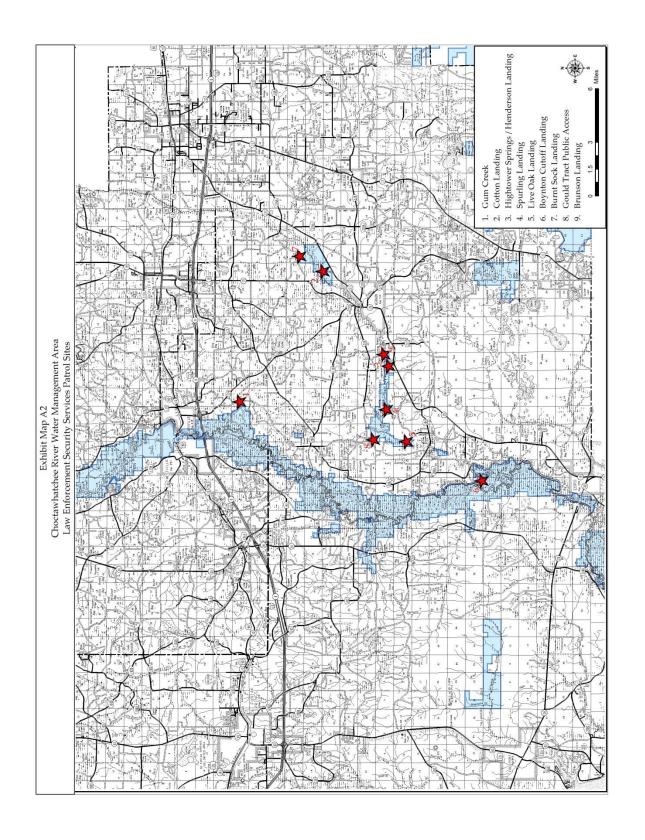
The Sheriff's Office will assign two deputies and two vehicles to patrol District lands (Area I and Area II) for the 12-month contract period. The following table contains the number of personnel hours and vehicle days for Areas I and II.

SUBJECT: Consideration of Resolution No. 801 to Declare Approximately Three

Acres of District Land for Exchange; Econfina Creek WMA

Recommendation:

Staff recommends approval of Resolution No. 801 for the exchange of approximately three acres in the Econfina Creek WMA. In addition, staff further recommends that the Governing Board make a determination that the parcel is no longer needed for conservation purposes in fee simple but can achieve conservation and protection of this tract through less-than-fee simple.

Background:

During the Lands Committee meeting on July 9, 2015, staff provided the Lands Committee with an overview of the District/Nix Exchange. The District would exchange three acres of District land encumbered by a conservation easement to Mr. Nix for 10 acres of property he owns in fee simple.

Resolution No. 801, if approved, will declare approximately three acres in the Econfina Creek WMA for exchange. This tract being exchanged was acquired in 1997. According to 373.089(6)(c), F.S., all lands for which title was vested in the governing board prior to July 1, 1999, shall be deemed to have been acquired for conservation purposes. This resolution requires a two-thirds vote for approval.

RESOLUTION NO. 801 TO THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION FOR EXCHANGE OF THREE ACRES; ECONFINA CREEK

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the Northwest Florida Water Management District (hereinafter referred to as the "District") has the duty and responsibility under Chapter 373, Florida Statutes, for the management of water and related land resources and for preservation of natural resources, fish and wildlife; and

WHEREAS, the District is governed by a governing board (hereinafter called the "Governing Board") as provided in Section 373.073, Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, the District owns certain real property; and

WHEREAS, the District has determined that it is in the best interest of the District to exchange approximately three acres of real property (the "Property") encumbered by a District conservation easement for approximately 10 acres, subject to boundary map/acreage certification, both of which are shown on the attached maps; and

WHEREAS, Section 373.089, Florida Statutes, authorizes the District to surplus and exchange real property provided certain requirements are met; and

WHEREAS, the legal interest to be exchanged is fee simple title encumbered by a District conservation easement in the three-acre parcel for fee simple interest in a 10-acre parcel; and

WHEREAS, such statutory requirements have been met or will be met prior to closing and the Governing Board wishes to enter into a contract and complete the exchange as set out therein; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Governing Board of Northwest Florida Water Management District as follows:

- 1. The Property is hereby determined to be surplus and no longer needed by the District for fee simple ownership.
- 2. Certified appraisal(s) shall show the appraised values of the parcels being exchanged.
- 3. Washington County has a population less than 100,000.

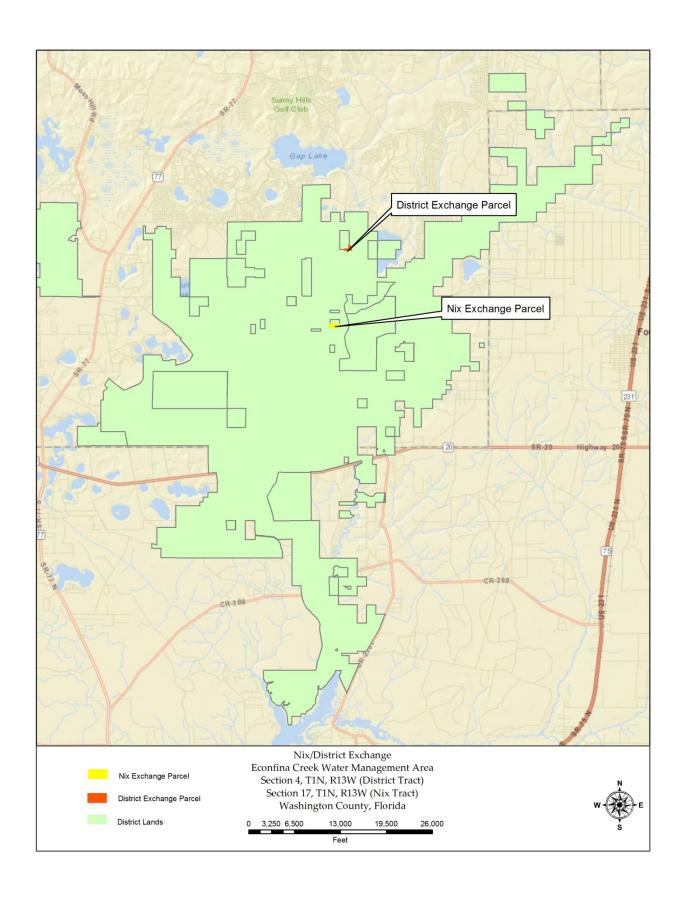

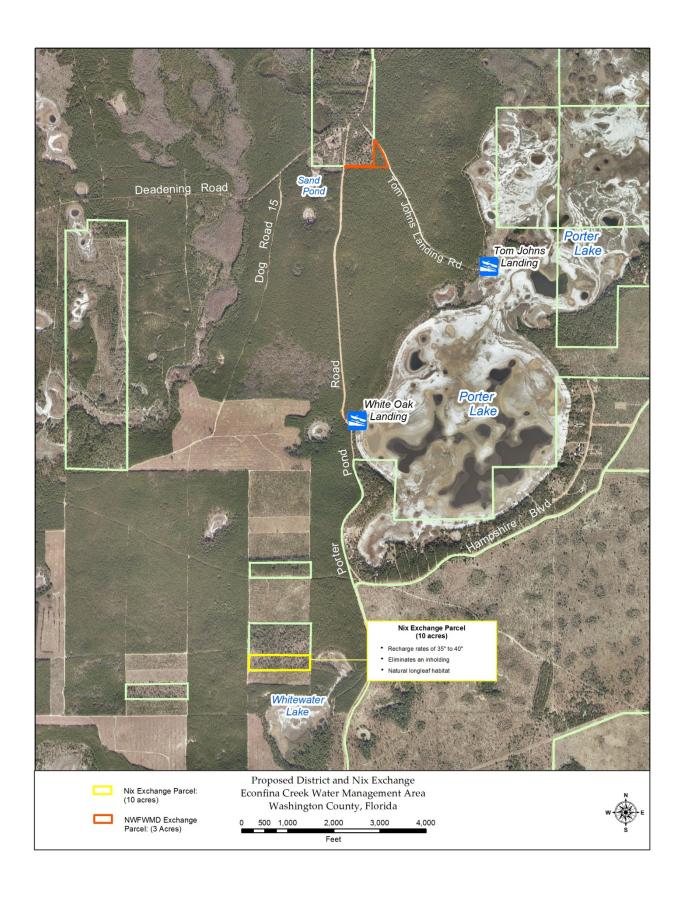

- 4. The exchange of the Property will meet the requirements of Section 373.089, Florida Statutes.

Causing a notice of intent to exchange the Property to be published in a newspaper published in the county in which the Property is situated once each week for three successive weeks, the first publication of which shall be not less than 30 days nor more than 45 days prior to the closing of the exchange of the Property as set out in the Contract.
 - ii. Closing the exchange of the Properties as set out in the Contract within 120 days after the above referenced certified appraisals were obtained or obtaining an updated or additional certified appraisal.
 - iii. Withholding execution and delivery of the deed of conveyance until the terms and conditions of the exchange are met according to the terms of the Contract.

SUBJECT: Consideration of Grant Agreement with the West Florida Resource Conservation

and Development Council for Northwest Florida Mobile Irrigation Lab Services

for Fiscal Year 2015-2016

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Governing Board authorize the Executive Director to enter into an agreement with the West Florida Resource Conservation & Development Council (WFRCDC) to provide up to \$71,125 in District grant funding for Northwest Florida Mobile Irrigation Lab services for Fiscal Year 2015-2016.

Discussion:

The Northwest Florida Mobile Irrigation Lab (NWFMIL) is to begin its 12th year of providing irrigation efficiency evaluations and related services within the District. This is an ongoing joint effort between the District, the National Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS). The NWFMIL is a free and voluntary service that helps the agricultural community increase irrigation efficiency, conserve water resources, prevent runoff, and reduce nutrient leaching while reducing operating costs. The NWFMIL is currently providing support for the District's agricultural Best Management Practices cost-share program. Since the program's inception in Northwest Florida, team members have completed 686 evaluations, covering an irrigated area of nearly 52,303 acres. The average total water savings estimated by NWFMIL personnel equal approximately 8.6 million gallons of water per day.

The NWFMIL services are provided through the WFRCDC and are funded through the District (\$71,125), FDACS (\$84,152 through a separate agreement), and the NRCS (\$61,450), who will provide in-kind budget expenses including office space, a vehicle, equipment and supplies. The total annual cost for the NWFMIL services is \$216,727. The District will receive quarterly reports summarizing all evaluations performed along with actual and potential water savings. The WFRCDC will also provide the District detailed documentation of project expenditures sufficient for audit purposes.

GRANT AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

THE NORTHWEST FLORIDA WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT

AND

THE WEST FLORIDA RESOURCE CONSERVATION & DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL

FOR

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NORTHWEST FLORIDA MOBILE IRRIGATION LAB THROUGHOUT FISCAL YEAR 2015-2016 NWFWMD CONTRACT NUMBER 16-004

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into by and between the NORTHWEST FLORIDA WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT, a public entity created by Chapter 373, Florida Statutes, as amended, hereinafter referred to as the "DISTRICT," and the West Florida Resource Conservation & Development Council, a Florida non-profit organization hereinafter referred to as the "GRANTEE."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the DISTRICT and the GRANTEE, participating with the United States Department of Agriculture Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS), recognize the common objective of helping to bring about conservation, development, and wise use of land, water, and related resources; and

WHEREAS, Mobile Irrigation Labs have been recognized as leaders in effecting and quantifying water conservation efforts in agricultural and urban settings; and

WHEREAS, the participating agencies previously developed a "Working Agreement" which established, in October 2004, a Northwest Florida Mobile Irrigation Lab (NWFMIL) that has been operating successfully for the past eleven years within the boundary of the DISTRICT; and

WHEREAS, the participating agencies recognize the mutual benefit of having entered into such an agreement and desire to perpetuate this agreement for another year; and

WHEREAS, the DISTRICT has budgeted funding, subject to Governing Board approval, for the purpose of providing assistance to agricultural producers within the DISTRICT; and

WHEREAS, the implementation, operation, and administration of the NWFMIL is described in the Scope of Work, attached hereto as ATTACHMENT 1 and by this reference incorporated herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of services to be performed for the public benefit hereunder, the DISTRICT and GRANTEE agree as follows:

1. The DISTRICT agrees:

- A. To provide funding not to exceed seventy-one thousand one hundred twenty-five dollars and NO/100 (\$71,125.00) for approved expenses in support of the NWFMIL operation, as described in ATTACHMENT 1.
- B. To provide payment of the funds indicated in Paragraph 1.A. for work satisfactorily completed, within 30 days of the DISTRICT's receipt and approval of invoices from the GRANTEE.
- C. To provide payment for services provided in accordance with this AGREEMENT through the end date of the contract period. No costs incurred prior to the execution of the AGREEMENT will be approved.
- D. To provide the GRANTEE copies of maps, documents, and digital geographic information it has available to recognize agricultural land use, Water Resource Caution Area boundaries, and spring recharge basin boundaries, as requested.

2. The GRANTEE agrees:

- A. To fully complete activities described in ATTACHMENT 1.
- B. To oversee the NWFMIL and provide technically trained personnel and any equipment necessary for the NWFMIL to carry out its annual work plan within the guidelines of the NRCS/FDACS Mobile Irrigation Lab Handbook January 2013 (Handbook).
- C. To provide training, in cooperation with the NRCS, to ensure that NWFMIL activities are in accordance with NRCS standards and procedures.
- D. To provide office facilities, supplies, personal computers, vehicles, and field equipment (to include flow meter), in cooperation with the NRCS.
- E. To seek cost share funding from the DISTRICT, the NRCS and FDACS to implement BMP tools and measures associated with the recommendations of the NWFMIL evaluation.
- F. To invoice the DISTRICT for work satisfactorily completed in support of the NWFMIL operation, as described in ATTACHMENT 1. Invoices may be submitted no more frequently than quarterly and must be submitted with supporting documentation and with sufficient detail for the proper pre-audit and post-audit thereof.
- G. To provide to the DISTRICT all deliverables specified in ATTACHMENT 1. Deliverables will be provided to DISTRICT staff during project implementation.
- H. To use funds obtained from the DISTRICT pursuant to this AGREEMENT solely for the purposes of the NWFMIL operation, as described in ATTACHMENT 1.
- I. To comply with all applicable federal, state and local rules and regulations in providing services under this AGREEMENT. The GRANTEE acknowledges that

- this requirement includes compliance with all applicable federal, state, and local health and safety rules and regulations.
- J. To maintain books, records, and documents directly pertinent to performance under this AGREEMENT in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles consistently applied. The DISTRICT, the State of Florida, or their authorized representatives shall have access to such records for auditing purposes during the term of this AGREEMENT and for three years following project completion.

3. It is mutually understood and agreed that:

- A. This AGREEMENT shall remain in effect for a period (the "contract period") of October 1, 2015 through September 30, 2016, unless extended by mutual written consent. Implementation of the project and all deliverables described in ATTACHMENT 1 must be completed on or before the end of the contract period.
- B. The DISTRICT shall have no liability or responsibility to the GRANTEE, its contractors, any governmental entity, or the employees, agents, representatives, licensees, invitees, and guests of the GRANTEE and its contractors or any other person or entity associated with the project, and the GRANTEE shall and hereby agrees to release, indemnify and hold harmless the DISTRICT against any and all injury, loss, liability, claim, damage and expense whatsoever (including all expenses reasonably incurred in investigating, preparing or defending against any claim whatsoever) including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses, arising out of, based upon or resulting from the GRANTEE's use of DISTRICT funds, representative, employee, contractor, invitee, permittee, customer or client of the GRANTEE, the negligence of another or any other third party, or the negligence of the DISTRICT.
- C. This AGREEMENT may be terminated by either of the parties upon at least 30 days prior written notice.
- D. The DISTRICT may unilaterally cancel this AGREEMENT for refusal by the GRANTEE to allow access to any and all documents, papers, letters, or other material made or received by the GRANTEE in conjunction with this AGREEMENT.
- E. This AGREEMENT is subject to the availability of budgeted funds anticipated at the time of execution. Should funding be discontinued or reduced, this AGREEMENT will be terminated or amended, as appropriate in the sole discretion of the DISTRICT. In such an event, the GRANTEE shall be compensated for work or services satisfactorily completed prior to termination or amendment of the AGREEMENT.
- F. In accordance with Section 215.971(1)(c), F.S., ATTACHMENT 1 identifies the level of service and financial consequences for nonperformance. If GRANTEE fails to produce the deliverables as specified within ATTACHMENT 1, the DISTRICT shall apply the financial consequences identified therein.
- G. This AGREEMENT constitutes the entire agreement between the DISTRICT and

- the GRANTEE and may be amended or extended only in writing, signed by both the DISTRICT and the GRANTEE.
- H. The DISTRICT and the GRANTEE may, by written amendment to this AGREEMENT, agree that additional work shall be undertaken within the general scope of this AGREEMENT.
- I. To the extent required by law, each contractor shall be required to secure and maintain such insurance as will protect it from claims under the Workers' Compensation Act and from claims for bodily injury, death, or property damage which may arise from the performance of its services under this AGREEMENT.
- J. A person or affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity, may not submit a bid or contract with a public entity for construction or repair of a public building or public work, may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity, may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with any public entity, and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, Florida Statutes, for CATEGORY TWO for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list. The convicted vendor list is maintained by the Florida Department of Management Services and may be accessed from the agency web site at www.dms.myflorida.com.
- K. An entity or affiliate who has been placed on the discriminatory vendor list may not submit a bid, proposal, or reply on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity; may not submit a bid, proposal, or reply on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids, proposals, or replies on leases of real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with any public entity; and may not transact business with any public entity. The discriminatory vendor list is maintained by the Florida Department of Management Services and may be accessed from the agency web site at www.dms.myflorida.com.
- L. As provided under Section 216.347, Florida Statutes, expenditure of DISTRICT grant funds for purposes of lobbying, including of the Legislature, judicial branch, or any state agency, is prohibited.
- M. Notices provided for in this AGREEMENT shall be delivered to the GRANTEE by delivery to the GRANTEE's Project Manager and to the DISTRICT by delivery to the DISTRICT Project Manager. The Project Managers are:

GRANT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE NORTHWEST FLORIDA WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT

AND

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NORTHWEST FLORIDA MOBILE IRRIGATION LAB
THROUGHOUT FISCAL YEAR 2015-2016

Project Description

The West Florida Resource Conservation and Development Council oversees the Northwest Florida Mobile Irrigation Lab (NWFMIL) that operates within the boundary of the DISTRICT. Fiscal Year 2015-2016 represents the twelfth year that the NWFMIL will provide irrigation efficiency evaluations and related services within the District. This is an ongoing joint effort between the District, the National Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS) to provide assistance to agricultural producers to increase irrigation efficiency, conserve water resources, prevent runoff, and reduce nutrient leaching while reducing operating costs. The NWFMIL is a free and voluntary service that helps the agricultural community.

The work of the NWFMIL supports the water conservation goals of the DISTRICT, specifically those related to agriculture irrigation. The NWFMIL primarily targets agricultural irrigators utilizing piped irrigation systems within delineated spring recharge basins in Jackson County and within the Water Resource Caution Area in Gadsden County. The Floridan aquifer and surface water streams are the main water sources for agriculture irrigation in these areas. Secondary priority will be given to operations that are outside these areas and have submitted a Notice of Intent to FDACS to implement Best Management Practices.

Benefits of NWFMIL work to the DISTRICT regarding conservative and efficient water use include: promotion of actual and potential agriculture irrigation water savings that are quantified; public education and outreach regarding conservative and efficient water use; flow rate verification for metered and non-metered systems resulting in improved accuracy of reported use amounts; provision of Irrigation Water Management Plans to irrigators; establishment of an effective, efficient cooperative work agreement with FDACS and NRCS; and support for producers applying to the District's agricultural best management practices cost-share program by verifying eligibility and recommending efficiency improvement measures.

Tasks

1. The NWFMIL will assist agricultural irrigators utilizing piped irrigation systems by evaluating individual irrigation systems and providing recommendations for the purpose of water conservation. The NWFMIL will give priority to systems within delineated

spring recharge basins in Jackson County and within the Water Resource Caution Area in Gadsden County.

Successful completion of this Task will be measured by performance of at least 20 irrigation system evaluations in each quarter and a total of 100 irrigation system evaluations throughout the DISTRICT during the contract period. In accordance with 287.058(1)(h), F.S., requiring financial consequences for nonperformance, failure to complete this task will result in reduction of payment of the contract by \$250 per evaluation less than the required number of evaluations.

- 2. The NWFMIL will also provide Irrigation Water Management Plans to the facilities receiving follow-up evaluations. These conservation-oriented plans include: an irrigation schedule, a soil moisture measurement method, an irrigation adjustment method to compensate for infiltration rate changes, an irrigation uniformity evaluation method, an irrigation application rate measurement method, a soil erosion evaluation method, a chemical application irrigation schedule, and a method for recognizing excess runoff.
 - Successful completion of this Task will be measured by providing Plans to at least 30 producers.
- 3. The NWFMIL shall promote water conservation education and publicize the availability of the NWFMIL services. Such public outreach can include, but is not limited to, participation in community-based fairs and workshops, seminars or classes provided by educational facilities or by commercial entities, programs provided by governmental agencies, public speaking engagements to civic organizations and clubs, and participation in public affairs broadcasting programs.

Successful completion of this Task will be measured by NWFMIL participation in at least five separate activities every six months with a total of 10 activities during the contract period.

Anticipated Schedule

The NWFMIL provides ongoing services which will continue through the contract period indicated in Paragraph 3A.

Anticipated Project Cost and Funding

The total cost of the NWFMIL operation is estimated at \$216,727. Grant funding through this AGREEMENT will not exceed \$71,125.00 and is available for costs to complete the project. The DISTRICT, after receipt of an invoice from the GRANTEE, shall provide the GRANTEE one payment each quarter of \$17,781.25. Per Section 3.F of this agreement, failure to complete the grant project as described in this Scope of Work and provide the required deliverables will result in partial reduction of grant funds not yet expended on the project.

Grant funding may not be applied to costs incurred prior to the execution of this contract.

Deliverables

The GRANTEE shall complete the project as described above. The GRANTEE shall complete and provide invoice and status documentation and quarterly progress reports as indicated below. All deliverables must be provided in electronic format.

- 1. The GRANTEE shall, within 15 working days of the end of each quarter (October-December 2015, January-March 2016, April-June 2016, and July-September 2016), have the NWFMIL complete and submit to the DISTRICT:
 - a. Quarterly reports described in Appendix A of the Handbook or equivalent; and
 - b. A brief description of completed public outreach activities; and
 - c. A copy of all individual farm evaluation reports conducted during the quarter; and,
 - d. A spreadsheet which tallies the number of initial and follow-up evaluations and actual and potential water savings, for each quarter since program inception and as a running total. Each individual farm evaluation report will be assigned a numeric identifier that will allow each farm evaluation report to be cross-referenced to the quarterly reports without identifying the farmer.
- 2. The following shall be provided with each invoice:
 - a. A numbered and dated invoice requesting funds from the DISTRICT; and
 - b. A description of activities completed during the invoice period and to which the invoices apply; and
 - c. Cost backup documentation, in sufficient detail for proper pre-audit and post-audit, such as copies of invoices to other participating funding entities (FDACS), estimates of in-kind contributions by NRCS, etc.
- 3. Within fourteen (14) days of the end of this contract period, the GRANTEE shall provide to the DISTRICT detailed documentation of project expenditures sufficient for proper pre-audit and post-audit purposes.

SUBJECT: Consideration of Grant Funding Agreement with the National Fish and Wildlife

Foundation and Supporting Consultant Services for Fiscal Year 2015-2016

Recommendation

Staff recommends that the Governing Board authorize the Executive Director to: (1) execute a grant agreement with the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, providing to the District up to \$695,000 to update the District's Surface Water Improvement and Management plans, and (2) execute supporting task orders with Ecology and Environment, Inc., for consulting services not to exceed \$266,787 for fiscal year (FY) 2015-2016, contingent upon approval of the District's FY 2015-2016 budget and subject to legal counsel review.

Discussion

Attached is a draft grant agreement providing up to \$695,000 to the District from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) through the Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund (GEBF). The GEBF consists of funds received by NFWF stemming from the Deepwater Horizon oil spill. These funds complement future funding expected to be available to mitigate the effects of the spill, including Natural Resource Damage Assessment (NRDA) and RESTORE¹ Act funding.

This grant funding will support updates to Surface Water Improvement and Management (SWIM) plans for each of the District's seven major estuarine watersheds. From the 1980s through the early 2000s, the District developed SWIM plans to guide and support watershed management and restoration across northwest Florida. These plans are an important resource for the District and for local governments and state agencies, describing current conditions, priority issues, and strategies to address water resource issues. The plans are also the foundation for many of the District's priority projects, including retrofitting stormwater management systems to improve water quality, restoring wetland and aquatic habitats, evaluating resource conditions and freshwater needs, and protecting and restoring springs. A defining characteristic of the SWIM program is that implementation is conducted primarily through cooperative projects, prioritized with regional stakeholders.

Activities during the coming year are expected to focus on working with technical advisory committees to evaluate watershed challenges and strategies, public outreach, and developing

updated assessments of conditions within each watershed. It is expected that the SWIM plan updates will be complete by October 2017.

This proposed grant agreement is one part of a larger effort funded by NFWF, to be implemented in cooperation with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, and the Suwannee River Water Management District (SRWMD), to develop a comprehensive restoration strategy for the Florida Panhandle and Big Bend regions. In addition to developing SWIM plans for northwest Florida, the strategy supports similar SWIM plan development for the SRWMD, development of detailed plans and metrics to facilitate seagrass recovery, and development of a comprehensive set of projects, categorized by funding priority. The resulting projects will be eligible for funding by the GEBF, RESTORE, and other associated sources, as well as by local governments and state agencies. It is anticipated that most of these projects will be implemented by local governments, improving conditions for communities across the region.

SWIM plan updates will be conducted by District staff with contractual services support. District staff will execute task orders with Ecology and Environment, Inc., to assist with updating watershed assessments and work with regional stakeholders to identify priority projects. Ecology and Environment was one of three top-ranked firms evaluated pursuant to the District's Request for Qualifications 13Q-002. In accordance with the District's tentative budget for fiscal year 2015-2016, spending for consultant services for this effort is not anticipated to exceed \$266,787 for the fiscal year.

NATIONAL FISH AND WILDLIFE FOUNDATION NORTHWEST FLORIDA WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT PROJECT FUNDING AGREEMENT

NFWF Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund Restoration Planning for the Florida Panhandle (FL) NFWF Project ID #49515

This Project Funding Agreement ("Agreement") is made between the Northwest Florida Water Management District ("Recipient"), with an address of 81 Water Management Drive, Havana, Florida 32333, and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation ("NFWF"), with an address of 1133 15th Street, N.W., Suite 1100, Washington D.C. 20005. (Recipient and NFWF each, a "Party," and together, the "Parties.")

- 1. <u>Source of Funds</u>. The funds to be disbursed by NFWF to Recipient under this Agreement (the "Funds") represent a portion of the payments received by NFWF pursuant to plea agreements entered as judgment in the cases captioned as <u>United States v. BP Exploration and Production, Inc.</u>, Case No. 2:12-cr-00292-SSV (E.D. La.), and <u>United States v. Transocean Deepwater Inc.</u>, Case No. 2:13-cr-00001-JTM (E.D. La.) (together, the "Plea Agreements").
- 2. **Purpose of Funds.** With respect to projects to be funded in the State of Florida, the Plea Agreements require NFWF to administer and disburse the Funds as follows:

To remedy harm and eliminate or reduce the risk of future harm to Gulf Coast natural resources, NFWF shall use [the Funds] to conduct or fund projects to remedy harm to resources where there has been injury to, or destruction of, loss of, or loss of use of those resources resulting from the Macondo oil spill. NFWF shall consult with appropriate state resource managers, as well as federal resource managers that have the statutory authority for coordination or cooperation with private entities, to identify projects and to maximize the environmental benefits of such projects.

- 3. **Project to be Funded.** Under this Agreement, NFWF agrees to disburse Funds to Recipient in accordance with the terms hereof to pay the costs associated with Recipient's implementation of the project entitled "Restoration Planning for the Florida Panhandle (FL)" (the "Project"). A detailed description of the Project, including but not limited to a Project summary, expected timeline and schedule, purpose, products, outcomes, and deliverables (collectively the "Project Description"), is included as Exhibit A hereto. Recipient hereby agrees to use the Funds disbursed to it under this Agreement exclusively to pay the costs of the services, time, materials, equipment, machinery, tools, and other items (collectively the "Work") comprising the Project, all in accordance with the Project Description.
- 4. <u>Maximum Amount of Funding</u>. Unless agreed otherwise in writing by NFWF (acting in its sole discretion), the amount of Funds to be made available by NFWF to Recipient under this Agreement for purposes of paying the costs of the Work shall not exceed a maximum of Six Hundred Ninety Five Thousand Dollars (\$695,000) (the "Maximum Amount").

5. <u>Project Budget</u>. The estimated budget for the entire Project from commencement through completion (the "Total Budget") is attached hereto as <u>Exhibit B</u>. The Budget further identifies the individual tasks ("Tasks") comprising the Work, and sets forth a sub-budget for each such Task ("Task Budget"). Task Budgets are further itemized into cost categories ("Cost Categories") reflecting the types of costs included in each Task Budget.

The Parties expect that the Recipient will conduct all the Work and complete the Project within the Total Budget and, accordingly, for a total amount of Funds equal to or less than the Maximum Amount. If at any time during the term of this Agreement Recipient believes, based on the Work performed to date, that the aggregate costs to complete the Project are likely to exceed the Total Budget, Recipient shall so notify NFWF immediately in writing.

- 6. Payment for Project Costs. Recipient may request payment of Funds hereunder either for Work costs already paid or incurred by Recipient (such requests, "Reimbursement Requests") or, upon a demonstration of actual and immitigable need, for Work costs to be paid or incurred by Recipient imminently (such requests, "Advance Requests"). Recipient shall make Reimbursement Requests and Advance Requests in accordance with the following procedures and subject to the following terms and conditions.
- a. <u>Reimbursement Requests</u>. Recipient may make Reimbursement Requests no more frequently than once monthly during the term of this Agreement. To receive payment for a Reimbursement Request, Recipient must submit to NFWF a written request, substantially in the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit C</u>, containing at a minimum the following information:
 - (i) the total dollar amount of Funds being requested;
 - (ii) an itemization by Task and Cost Category of the Work costs for which the Funds are being requested;
 - (iii) a narrative description of the Work for which the Funds are being requested; and
 - (iv) a certification that:
 - (A) the Work for which the Funds are being requested constitutes part of the Project as set forth in the Project Description;
 - (B) as of the date of the applicable Reimbursement Request, each Task has been proceeding on or under its corresponding Task Budget and, to Recipient's best knowledge, Recipient expects each Task to be fully completed on or under its corresponding Task Budget, and;
 - (C) as of the date of the applicable Reimbursement Request, the Project has been proceeding on or under the Total Budget and, to Recipient's best knowledge, Recipient expects the Project to be fully completed on or under the Total Budget.

In the event Recipient is unable to make a certification specified in subsections (a)(iv)(B)-(C) immediately above at the time Recipient desires to submit a Reimbursement Request, Recipient shall, at such time, submit to NFWF a written explanation of the basis for Recipient's belief that a Task has not been, or will not be, completed within its corresponding Task Budget or that the Project has not been, or will not be, fully completed within the Total Budget. After receipt and review of such written explanation, NFWF will determine in its sole discretion whether to disburse the requested Funds and whether additional conditions to

disbursement are required be satisfied by Recipient. Such conditions may include, but are not necessarily limited to, Recipient's submission for NFWF approval of an amended Total Budget or a request for variance from a Task Budget.

NFWF will pay to Recipient the amount of Funds properly requested and substantiated in a Reimbursement Request within thirty (30) days of NFWF's receipt of such Reimbursement Request and all necessary supporting documentation.

- b. Advance Payment Requests. In exceptional circumstances and based upon demonstration of actual need by Recipient, which need cannot be satisfied by Recipient through other means, NFWF (acting in its sole discretion) may disburse Funds to Recipient to pay for the costs of Work in advance of Recipient's payment or incurring of such costs. In the event Recipient desires to make an Advance Request, Recipient must submit to NFWF a detailed written explanation of the justification for the Advance Request. After review and consideration of any such written explanation, NFWF will notify Recipient in writing of its determination whether a disbursement of Funds will be made for such Advance Request and, if so, the terms and conditions that will apply to such disbursement. In all cases of advance disbursement of Funds, and without limitation of other terms and conditions that NFWF may impose, Recipient will be required to submit to NFWF on a periodic basis (as specified by NFWF) a written reconciliation of Funds received, Work expenses incurred, Funds disbursed to sub-recipients, and any Funds remaining "on hand" with Recipient as of the date of reconciliation.
- c. <u>Ongoing Compliance</u>. NFWF reserves the right to refuse to pay all or any part of the Funds requested in a Reimbursement Request or Advance Request if at the time the request is submitted Recipient has failed to comply with any term or condition of this Agreement or has otherwise failed to perform the Work to date in accordance with the Project Description, Total Budget, and Task Budget(s).
- d. <u>Final Disbursement after Completion of all Work</u>. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, NFWF shall withhold payment of the final Reimbursement Request submitted by Recipient until such time as Recipient has completed the Work and submitted to NFWF all deliverables associated with the Work and this Agreement (including but not limited to the Final Reports required pursuant to Section 8 below). Within thirty (30) days after NFWF's receipt and acceptance of all such deliverables, NFWF shall disburse to Recipient the amount of Funds properly requested and duly payable under such final Reimbursement Request.

7. **Progress Reporting**.

- a. <u>Monthly Progress Consultations</u>. If requested by NFWF, Recipient shall provide NFWF the opportunity to participate in consultations on a monthly basis during the term of this Agreement to provide NFWF with updates on the progress of the Work and Project. Such consultations (which may be in-person, telephonic, or otherwise) shall be scheduled at mutually acceptable dates and times by Recipient in coordination with NFWF.
- b. <u>Quarterly Progress Reports.</u> By January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each calendar year during the term of this Agreement, Recipient shall prepare and upload to NFWF's electronic grants management system a quarterly progress report containing at least the

information set forth in this paragraph (b). Each quarterly progress report is required to provide such information for the period comprised of the immediately preceding three months. Each quarterly progress report is required to contain, at a minimum:

- i. An update on the status of the Project's implementation and Work performed during the applicable reporting period, including a general description of implementation progress to date and a statement as to whether the Project is proceeding in accordance with the Project Description (including whether the Project is on-Budget and on-schedule);
- ii. An update on the individual Tasks comprising the Project, including for each Task a summary of (A) the Work performed on such Task during the reporting period; (B) progress made toward Task milestone(s) and/or deliverable(s) as measured against the Task schedule; (C) performance of the Task as against the applicable Task Budget; (D) any existing or anticipated problems with implementation of the Task; any defects, deficiencies, or delays in the Task Work (including but not limited to the disclosure of any factors that are likely to impact the Project schedule or any Task schedule); and any remedial action(s) planned or already taken with respect to any defects, deficiencies, or delays affecting the Task;
- iii. Copies of all Project products and deliverables produced during the applicable reporting period, including but not necessarily limited to any reports, publications, maps, brochures, photos, videos, outreach tools, or press releases;
- iv. Any other information reasonably necessary for NFWF's evaluation of the Project's progress as measured against the Project Description, Budget, and Project schedule.

8. Final Reports.

When Recipient believes that it has fully and completely performed all the Work, Recipient shall prepare and upload to NFWF's electronic grants management system a comprehensive report on the Work and the corresponding results (the "Final Programmatic Report") and a full accounting of the funds disbursed to it hereunder as compared against the Total Budget (the "Final Financial Report"). (The Final Programmatic Report and Final Financial Report are hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Final Reports.") As appropriate, the Final Programmatic Report should include copies of any publications, press releases, and other documents, materials, and products developed as part of the Project, including without limitation photographs, video footage, and other electronic representations of the Project and Work. The Final Reports shall be provided by Recipient to NFWF as soon as practicable after Recipient reaches a determination that it has fully and completely performed all the Work, and in any event no later than thirty (30) days prior to the end of the Term of this Agreement as set forth in Section 17.

- 10. <u>Incorporation of the Project Proposal and Total Budget.</u> The Project Description and Total Budget are hereby expressly incorporated into this Agreement by this reference.
- 11. **Assignment.** Recipient may not assign this Agreement, in whole or in part, to any other individual or other legal entity without the prior written consent of NFWF.

12. <u>Independent Contractor</u>; <u>Subaward of Funds by Recipient</u>. Recipient shall be an independent contractor with respect to the Project, each part thereof, and the Work, and no contractor, subcontractor, or other recipient of Funds from Recipient (each, a "Sub-recipient"), nor any employee of a Sub-recipient, shall be deemed to be an agent, representative, employee, or servant of NFWF in connection with this Agreement. NFWF shall not have the right to control, nor any actual, potential or other control over, the methods and means by which Recipient or any of its agents, representatives, employees, or Sub-recipients conducts its business operations. Recipient shall not, in the performance of the Work, perform any act or make any representation to any person to the effect that Recipient or any of its agents, representatives, employees, or Sub-recipients is the agent, representative, employee, or servant of NFWF.

If Recipient makes or issues any award or subaward of Funds to any Sub-recipient for purposes of performing the Work, then Recipient will be deemed to have represented and warranted to NFWF at each such time, in connection with each such award or subaward, as follows:

- in making such award or subaward of Funds, Recipient has complied with all applicable laws, regulations, rules, orders, and other governmental mandates, including, without limitation, those pertaining to procurement, acquisition, and other contracting actions by Recipient;
- b. in making such award or subaward of Funds, Recipient has complied with its internal policies and procedures applicable to procurement, acquisition, or contracting actions;
- c. each Sub-recipient is qualified to perform the applicable Work and is authorized to do business in the State of Florida:
- d. each Sub-recipient is required under its agreement with Recipient to perform the applicable Work within budgeted costs identified for such Work as provided in the Project Budget;

NFWF shall not be deemed by virtue of this Agreement to have any contractual obligation to, or relationship

with, any Sub-recipient, and the Parties agree and acknowledge that as between NFWF and Recipient all Work shall be deemed to be the responsibility of, and performed by, Recipient.

- 13. NFWF Right to Inspect Work; Access. NFWF and its representatives and consultants shall, upon reasonable prior notice to Recipient, have access to inspect all Work hereunder; provided, however, that any inspection of the Work shall be conducted at a reasonable time and in a manner that does not delay or disrupt the Work. Notwithstanding any review or inspection by NFWF, Recipient shall not be relieved of its responsibility for performance of the Work or the submission of reports as expressly set forth in this Agreement solely by virtue of NFWF's inspection or review of the Work. Recipient shall provide NFWF and its representatives and consultants with the opportunity to participate in site inspections, meetings, and/or teleconferences, as appropriate, related to Recipient's performance of the Work and completion of the Project.
- 14. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>. During the term of this Agreement, Recipient will maintain in effect policies governing conflicts of interest and, with respect to its performance of the Work and Project, will adhere to such policies.
- 15. <u>Unexpended Funds</u>. Any Funds provided by NFWF and held by Recipient and not expended or obligated for Work on or before the Agreement's termination date will be returned by Recipient to NFWF within thirty (30) days after such termination date.
- 16. <u>Amendments</u>. Any amendment to this Agreement must be in writing and must be consented to in writing by both parties. Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, any duly executed amendment of this Agreement to extend its term shall be deemed to automatically add or modify, as appropriate, reporting due dates pursuant to Section 5 and 6 hereof such that the dates are commensurate with the extended term of this Agreement. Neither the Project Description, nor the Total Budget, nor any Task Budget may be amended without the prior written consent of NFWF.

Any such Notice of Default shall describe in reasonable detail the basis for NFWF's determination of default and shall provide Recipient with a period of no less than ninety (90) days in which to cure such default (or, if such default is incapable of being cured within ninety (90) days, to commence a cure of such default). If Recipient has not cured or, as the case may be, commenced a cure of, any default within ninety (90) days of its receipt of a Notice of Default, NFWF may thereafter terminate this Agreement by a further written notice delivered to Recipient.

Recipient may terminate this Agreement by providing no less than thirty (30) days' prior written notice to NFWF.

In the event of termination of this Agreement prior to Recipient's expenditure or obligation of the maximum amount of Funds available hereunder, Recipient shall immediately (unless otherwise directed by NFWF in its notice if NFWF initiated the termination) undertake all reasonable steps to terminate any further expenditure or obligation of Funds, including but not limited to the following:

- a. Stop work on any portion of the Work that is incomplete, and refrain from undertaking any further Work on the Project.
- b. Place no further Work orders or enter into any further contracts or subcontracts for materials, work, facilities, or other aspects of the Work.
- c. Terminate all pending Work orders, contracts, and subcontracts for Work that have not yet commenced.
- d. Promptly take all other reasonable and feasible steps to minimize and/or mitigate any damages that may be caused by the failure to complete the Work, including but not limited to reasonable settlements of any outstanding claims arising out of termination of Work orders, contracts, and subcontracts related to the Work.
- e. Deliver or make available to NFWF all data, drawings, specifications, reports, estimates, summaries, deliverables, and such other information and material as may have been accumulated by Recipient with respect to the Work, whether completed or in progress.
- f. Return to NFWF any unobligated or unspent portion of the Funds then held by Recipient.
- 18. <u>Additional Support</u>. By entering into this Agreement, NFWF assumes no obligation to provide further funding or financial support to Recipient beyond the terms stated in this Agreement.

19. **Arbitration and Choice of Law**.

- a. All claims, disputes, and other matters in question arising out of, or relating to this Agreement, its interpretation or breach shall be decided through arbitration by a person or persons mutually acceptable to both NFWF and Recipient. Notice of the demand for arbitration shall be made within a reasonable time after the claim, dispute, or other matter in question has arisen. The award rendered by the arbitrator or arbitrators shall be final.
- b. This Agreement shall be subject to and interpreted by the laws of the State of Florida, without regard to choice of law principles. By entering into this

Agreement, Recipient agrees to submit to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of Florida.

c. The terms of this Section will survive termination of this Agreement.

20. <u>Compliance with Laws; Insurance; Indemnification</u>.

- a. In conducting its activities relating to the Work and performing its obligations under this Agreement, Recipient agrees to conduct all such activities in compliance with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws, regulations, and ordinances; and to secure all appropriate and necessary public or private permits and consents.
- b. Recipient agrees to obtain and maintain all appropriate insurance against liability for injury to persons or property from any and all activities undertaken by Recipient and associated with this Agreement in any way; will have NFWF named as an additional insured on all such policies; and will provide NFWF with appropriate Certificates of Insurance reflecting such additions within sixty (60) days after this Agreement is fully executed.
- c. Recipient shall indemnify and hold harmless NFWF and its officers, directors, agents, representatives, and employees in respect of any and all claims, injuries, losses, diminution in value, damages, liabilities, whether or not currently due, and related expenses (including without limitation, settlement costs and any legal or other expenses for investigating or defending any actions or threatened actions) arising from or in connection with the Work or Recipient's performance under this Agreement, including but not limited to, environmental laws, regulations, orders and decrees of whatever character or nature and damage or injury to persons or property.
- d. The terms of this Section will survive termination of this Agreement.
- 21. <u>Publicity</u>. Recipient agrees to give appropriate credit to the "National Fish and Wildlife Foundation" for its financial support in any and all press releases, publications, annual reports, video credits, dedications, and other public communications regarding this Agreement or any of the deliverables associated with the Project, the Work, and/or this Agreement. The Recipient hereby grants NFWF the right and authority to publicize NFWF's financial support for the Project and the Work in press releases, publications and other public communications.
- 22. <u>Disclaimers</u>. Payments made to Recipient under this Agreement do not by direct reference or implication convey NFWF's endorsement of the Work or any deliverables provided pursuant to the Agreement. All information submitted for publication or other public releases of information regarding this Agreement, the Project, or the Work shall carry the following disclaimer:

"The views and conclusions contained in this document are those of the authors and should not be interpreted as representing the opinions, views,

or policies of the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation. Nothing contained herein constitutes an endorsement in any respect by the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation."

- 23. <u>Website Links</u>. Recipient agrees to permit NFWF to post a link on any or all of NFWF's websites to descriptions of the Work, the Project, or this Agreement.
- 24. **Evaluation**. Recipient agrees to cooperate with NFWF by providing timely responses to all reasonable requests for information to assist in evaluating the accomplishments of the Project and this Agreement for a period of five (5) years after the date on which the Final Reports are provided.
- 25. Access to Records. NFWF and any of its duly authorized representatives shall have access to any books, documents, papers and records of Recipient that are directly pertinent to this Agreement for purposes of making audits, examinations, excerpts, or transcription during the term of this Agreement and for a period of five (5) years after the date of delivery of the Final Reports under this Agreement. By executing this Agreement and accepting disbursements of Funds hereunder, Recipient agrees, without limiting any other obligation under this Agreement, to produce, maintain, and retain such invoices, purchase orders, bills, time records, evidence of payment, and other documents as are necessary to permit NFWF to verify the proper use and expenditure of the Funds disbursed to Recipient hereunder.

Exhibit A Project Description

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Restoration Planning for the Florida Panhandle (FL)

1. Project Description

The Northwest Florida Water Management District (NWFWMD), in cooperation with public and private stakeholders, will update and modernize watershed plans for each of the major estuarine watersheds of northwest Florida. These efforts will build upon past accomplishments under Florida's Surface Water Improvement and Management (SWIM) program, as well as community-based watershed planning processes underway across the region. The watersheds addressed through this initiative include:

- 1) Perdido River and Bay (including Perdido Bay and Big Lagoon);
- 2) Pensacola Bay System (including Pensacola, Escambia, East, and Blackwater bays and western Santa Rosa Sound);
- 3) Choctawhatchee River and Bay (including eastern Santa Rosa Sound, Choctawhatchee Bay, and coastal dune lakes);
- 4) St. Andrew Bay (including St. Andrew, North, West, East, and St. Joseph bays, and Lake Powell);
- 5) Apalachicola River and Bay (including Apalachicola and East bays, St. Vincent Sound, St. George Sound, and Alligator Harbor);
- 6) Ochlockonee River and Bay; and
- 7) St. Marks River and Apalachee Bay.

These watersheds encompass all of northwest Florida's coastal waters with their contributing basins, including the region's major river systems. Each has existing approved or preliminary watershed plans that were completed under the auspices of Florida's SWIM program (nwfwater.com/water-resources/swim/). Each of the SWIM plans need to be updated to better reflect current conditions and resources, to provide updated and improved project guidance, and to better support a regional response to the effects of the Deepwater Horizon oil spill.

The scope of work includes engagement of technical advisory committees for each watershed with representation from governmental and private stakeholders; focused public outreach and engagement; identification of current conditions; establishment of realistic goals and operational objectives; and project identification, description, and prioritization. The completed plans will support long-term efforts to protect and restore water quality, aquatic ecosystems, and wetland and riparian habitats within and along the northern Gulf of Mexico.

Implementation of the project will be accomplished through four tasks:

- **Task 1**: Engage technical advisory committees to further identify and articulate current watershed issues, develop watershed planning goals and objectives, identify and prioritize strategies and projects, and assist in development and review of updated plans.
- **Task 2**: Conduct focused public outreach and engagement, to include public workshops within each watershed.
- **Task 3**: Develop priority project descriptions to achieve goals and objectives established for each watershed.

Task 4: Complete updated plans for the region's major watersheds to include realistic goals, operational objectives, and priority projects for each watershed.

2. Project Background

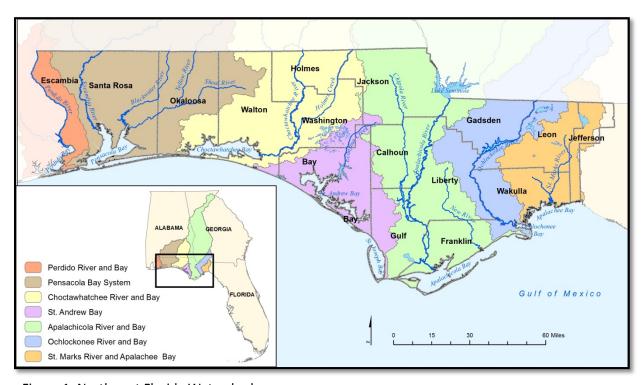


Figure 1. Northwest Florida Watersheds

Northwest Florida's watersheds drain to the Florida Panhandle's coast on the northern Gulf of Mexico. Coastal waters in the region include Perdido, Pensacola, Choctawhatchee, St. Andrew, St. Joseph, Apalachicola, Ochlockonee, and Apalachee bays and Santa Rosa Sound (Figure 1). These estuarine systems are among the state's most productive. They embody a zone of habitat diversity and productivity and include seagrass communities, shellfish beds, and salt marshes, among other habitat types. The region also supports coastal dune lakes, which are unique to northwest Florida, and other endemic habitats and species. These resources and their associated watershed functions provide important public benefits and help define the character of the surrounding communities. Among these benefits are high quality water resources, abundant fish and wildlife, flood attenuation, recreational opportunities, and aesthetic values. These are critical to the health of the Gulf of Mexico and integral to the region's economy and the quality of life of residents and visitors.

The character of most of northwest Florida's estuaries is strongly influenced by riverine inflow. The region has three of Florida's five largest rivers: the Apalachicola, Choctawhatchee, and Escambia. The largest rivers of northwest Florida drain extensive watershed areas within Alabama and Georgia as well as Florida. They are alluvial, receiving most of their flow from overland runoff and surficial aquifer flow. Several other rivers and streams, including the Wakulla, St. Marks, and Chipola rivers and Holmes and Econfina creeks, are karst streams.

These receive a major portion of flow from numerous Floridan aquifer springs and tend to have relatively consistent flows. Spring discharges are vital to aquatic habitats and species, and they are valued for public recreation and enjoyment. They also provide important linkages between surface and ground water systems and help define the characteristics of many waterbodies, including riverine tributaries and receiving coastal waters.

The District developed SWIM plans for these watersheds and associated waterbodies beginning in the late 1980s, as follows:

- 1) Deer Point Lake (within the St. Andrew Bay watershed): 1988;
- 2) Lake Jackson (within the Ochlockonee River watershed): 1988, 1990, 1994, 1997;
- 3) Pensacola Bay System: 1988, 1990, 1997;
- 4) Apalachicola River and Bay Watershed: 1992, 1996;
- 5) Choctawhatchee River and Bay Watershed: 1996, 2002;
- 6) St. Marks River and Apalachee Bay Watershed: 1997, 2009;
- 7) St. Andrew Bay Watershed: 2000;
- 8) Perdido River and Bay Watershed: 2011 (draft);
- 9) Ochlockonee River and Bay Watershed: 2012 (draft).

Significant opportunities exist for restoration and enhancement within these watersheds. Historically, the region's watersheds and coastal waters experienced adverse effects from urban stormwater runoff, domestic and industrial wastewater, widespread sedimentation, and habitat loss and alteration. The 2010 Deepwater Horizon oil spill directly impacted the region, which includes all of Florida's eight disproportionately affected counties.

3. Scope of Work

Task 1 – Engage technical advisory committees to further identify and articulate current watershed issues, develop watershed planning goals and objectives for each basin, identify and prioritize strategies and projects, and assist in the development and review of updated watershed plans. Participation will be invited and requested from local governments, state and federal resource agencies, public and private watershed and resource initiatives, and other public and private stakeholders. This effort will build upon and continue the intensive community-based watershed planning process initiated in 2013 by The Nature Conservancy in cooperation with state and local governments.

Task deliverables will include meeting notices and summaries, as well as comments and recommendations provided by committee members with respect to watershed issues, strategies, projects, and plans.

Task 2 – Conduct public outreach, to include public workshops held locally for each watershed and an internet site that will provide access to watershed details, program information, project contacts, and draft and final planning documents. The workshops and internet site will provide members of the public, as well as local government and resource agency stakeholders, with the opportunity to participate in plan development and project prioritization. Public outreach activities shall be conducted to meet the requirements of section 373.453(3), Florida Statutes, and to ensure that community needs are understood and local knowledge is incorporated. This is expected to both enhance community support and to ensure effective,

outcome-oriented plans are developed. All public meetings will be appropriately noticed and advertised. Task deliverables will include meeting notices, agendas and other documentation, meeting summaries, and documented public comments.

Task 3 – Identify and describe priority projects designed to achieve goals and objectives established for each watershed. Project descriptions will be developed to support implementation by local governments or other cooperators as funding becomes available. Priority projects are expected to include such activities as urban stormwater retrofits; implementation of watershed best management practices; restoration and enhancement of wetland, riparian, and floodplain habitats and functions; public outreach and engagement; and monitoring. Such activities are mutually supportive and complementary; leading to improvement of water quality, aquatic and coastal habitat quality, watershed functions, coastal resiliency, and associated public values and benefits. Project planning is also expected to incorporate results of associated efforts within Florida's overall Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund Restoration Strategy.

Task deliverables will include descriptions and order of magnitude cost estimates for priority projects designed to achieve the goals and objectives established within the watershed plans. The project descriptions and anticipated costs will be incorporated within the plans developed through Task 4.

Task 4 – Complete updated watershed plans for the region's major watersheds. Each of the NWFWMD watershed plans will be updated and modernized, to include information and priorities developed through associated projects, such as the *Assessment of Submerged Habitat for Restoration*, within Florida's overall Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund Restoration Strategy. The plans will be developed in a manner consistent with Florida's SWIM program, to include realistic goals and operational objectives for each watershed. They will be developed in cooperation with and with participation by technical advisory committees and members of the public as described above. Final approval will be accomplished through a public hearing process in accordance with section 373.453, Florida Statutes. Task deliverables will include draft and final watershed plans.

Outcomes

Watershed plans will be updated for each of the major watersheds in northwest Florida. In the process, project priorities will be developed to support accomplishment of goals and objectives established for each watershed. This process will also support and complement related initiatives, including Florida's Total Maximum Daily Load program and potentially the establishment of a National Estuary or related programs. More specifically, this project will provide for:

- Completion of updated watershed management plans for each of the region's seven major watersheds in accordance with statutory requirements for the SWIM program and supporting the goals and objectives of the Gulf Coast Ecosystem Restoration Council Comprehensive Plan.
- Identification of a current set of realistic goals and operational objectives for each watershed. This will include a program monitoring plan and guidelines for project specific monitoring and success criteria.

• Identification and description of priority projects designed to achieve the established goals and objectives. Priority project descriptions will be developed so projects can be readily implemented by local governments or other cooperators as funding becomes available. The specific projects to be prioritized will include such activities as urban stormwater retrofits; implementation of watershed best management practices; restoration and enhancement of wetland, riparian, and floodplain habitats and functions; public outreach and engagement; and associated monitoring.

A short-term benefit of this effort includes enhanced coordination of watershed planning across multiple entities and jurisdictions within northwest Florida. This is important given the numerous related but independent planning efforts being conducted at the state and local level, primarily in response to the RESTORE Act. Over the long-term, completion of effective and up-to-date watershed-based restoration plans is expected to result in improved protection and restoration of water quality and associated coastal and estuarine habitats. This initiative is consistent with the purpose of the Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund.

Major uncertainties and risks associated with this initiative primarily center on future implementation funding. Past initiatives have demonstrated the difficulty of predicting long-term implementation of major programs. It is anticipated that completion of updated plans will help address this uncertainty by increasing assurances for federal, state, local, and private funding entities.

Risks associated with long-term management and maintenance of restoration and infrastructure projects are effectively addressed through the approach of engaging local governments for implementation. A defining characteristic of the SWIM program is that implementation is conducted primarily through cooperative projects, prioritized with regional stakeholders. Project implementation, ownership, and long-term maintenance will be accomplished by local governments and other watershed partners. This characteristic helps ensure long-term maintenance and the continuing success of completed projects.

Key Project Staff

Staff from the Northwest Florida Water Management District will accomplish and coordinate project implementation. By position, these staff include:

- Chief, Environmental and Resource Planning Bureau
- Manager, Resource Planning Program
- Water Resource Planner IV
- OPS Technical Assistant

Additional Resource Management Division staff are anticipated to contribute to the project as needed, with more participation in the second year of the project. Consultant services will also be important toward staffing of this project. In order to achieve the completion of seven watershed plan updates within the timeframe, consultants will provide the additional staffing capacity primarily for plan development and assistance with the Technical Advisory Committee.

4. Schedule

The goal is to complete this effort within approximately 24 months. A general schedule for planning purposes is as follows:

September-November 2015 – Initial research and data compilation; contractor engagement

December 2015 – Stakeholder notification, establishment of TACs

January 2016 – Updated website in place, supporting plan development

January-February 2016 – Initial TAC meetings

October-December 2016 – Public workshops

5. Long-Term Management

As described, this section is not directly applicable the planning project. However, long-term management and maintenance of the identified priority projects will be addressed within the watershed plans. Such projects, for example, may include habitat restoration and water quality treatment systems, for which long-term maintenance are critical to success.

6. Project Monitoring and Adaptive Management

As described, this section is not directly applicable to the planning project. However, project staff will continually monitor progress to ensure the project is completed on schedule. Task milestones and deliverables will be established for assigned contractors to ensure timely and accurate implementation.

7. Partnerships

Through the Technical Advisory Committee and Public Outreach tasks, this planning effort will build upon and strengthen partnerships across agencies and other stakeholders. Among these are municipal and county governments; the Florida departments of Environmental Protection, Agriculture and Consumer Services, and Economic Opportunity; the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission; regional planning councils; and the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. Participating regional watershed and resource programs are expected to include the Pensacola Bay Area Resource Council, Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance of Northwest Florida State College, the Friends of St. Andrew Bay, the St. Andrew Bay Resource Management Association, and The Nature Conservancy, among others.

DESCRIPTION:

Eglin Air Force Base (EAFB) is in the process of consolidating numerous Individual Water Use Permits (IWUPs) into eight permits delineated by region and use type. The permits issued to date in furtherance of this goal are for the Southwest, Northeast, Southeast regions and the Duke Field/7th Special Forces Group Cantonment, which consolidated a number of individual IWUPs, including a number of unpermitted wells. This application will consolidate IWUPs 3001-4 and 3002-3 for Mainbase Housing public supply into IWUP 3002-3.

EAFB withdraws water from the Floridan Aquifer to meet the potable supply and mission support demands of approximately 7,368 users in the Mainbase Housing region of the base. The requested withdrawal amounts represent a 39% and 50% reduction from the previously permitted average daily and maximum monthly withdrawals, respectively. The reductions in the withdrawal amounts are the result of EAFB's continuing conservation efforts to reduce and eliminate use of the Floridan Aquifer for non-potable applications.

Staff analyzed impacts to the Floridan aquifer from the withdrawal of recommended amounts using the program DRAWDOWN. The simulated drawdowns in the Floridan Aquifer were less than a foot at distances of one-half mile and one mile, respectively, from the center of pumpage. No harm to water resources or existing legal uses is anticipated to occur from the proposed withdrawals.

PERMIT APPLICATION REVIEW:

Section 373.223, Florida Statutes (F.S.), and section 40A-2.301, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), require an applicant to establish that the proposed use of water:

- (a) Is a reasonable-beneficial use:
- (b) Will not interfere with any presently existing legal use of water; and,
- (c) Is consistent with the public interest.

In addition, the above requirements are detailed further in the District's Water Use Permit Applicant's Handbook. District staff have reviewed the water use permit application pursuant to the above-described requirements and have determined that the application meets the conditions for issuance of this permit. Highlights of the staff review are provided below.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is the determination of the staff that the water use amounts recommended, as conditioned, are reasonable-beneficial, consistent with the public's interest, and will not harm the water resources of the area or interfere with existing legal users. This determination has been made according to provisions of Chapter 373, F.S., and Chapter 40A-2, F.A.C.

Staff recommends that the applicant be granted an Individual Water Use Permit for an annual average daily withdrawal of 2.20 million gallons; a maximum monthly withdrawal of 105.0 million gallons. Staff also recommends that the expiration date of the permit remain August 1, 2035, and that the permit be conditioned as per the "Conditions for Issuance" included in Exhibit A of the permit document.
